Currency

On the Dutch side of Saint Martin, the official currency is the Antillean Guilder (ANG). However, it's important to note that the US Dollar is widely accepted and preferred for transactions. In fact, US Dollars are accepted almost everywhere and for all types of purchases. It is recommended to have US Dollars on hand for your expenses on the Dutch side.

On the French side, the official currency is the Euro. Similar to the Dutch side, the US Dollar is widely accepted on the French side of the island. However, it's a good idea to carry some Euros, especially if you plan to visit establishments that exclusively accept Euros. Additionally, certain services such as shipyards and dentists may bill in Euros, so having a credit card with a favorable currency exchange rate can be beneficial.

Electrical

On the French side, the electrical system operates on single-phase European 220 volts. European-style plugs and outlets are used, so it's important to have the necessary adapters or converters if you plan to use devices that are not compatible with this voltage and plug type. It's advisable to check the electrical compatibility of your equipment before your trip or consult with the marina or accommodation where you'll be staying.

Despite the seamless integration of French and Dutch territories on land, there are distinct rules and procedures when it comes to moving your vessel from one side to the other. While border enforcement on land is minimal, you are required to check out of one country and into the other if moving your vessel across borders—fuel trips and single-day service facility visits are notable exceptions.

Checking In on the French Side: A Laid-Back Affair

The check-in procedures on the French side, similar to other French islands, are quite relaxed. You can typically complete the process in either of the French-side chandleries—Ile Marine or Island Water World—where a self-service computer terminal and printer are provided. To check in, you need the ship's papers, passports for all crew and guests, and either \$2 or €2 for processing. Unlike many places, your previous stop's clearance isn't strictly required. While guests can accompany, it isn't necessary or generally advised. An employee from the chandlery will review the paperwork. These procedures can also be undertaken at the Capitanery in Anse Marcel. Although check-in/out is available at the commercial port in Galisbay, it's a long dinghy ride and not typically recommended.

Checking In on the Dutch Side: A Formal Affair

The Dutch side's check-in process is typically conducted at Simpson Bay, in the police station near the Dutch Side bridge. This office operates 7 am to 5 pm, seven days a week. Here, the procedure is more formal as you'll interact directly with Customs and Immigration officials, who may ask a few questions. Like the French side, bring the ship's papers and passports for all crew and guests. However, clearance from your last port is required. Additionally, there is a fee for anchoring on the Dutch side based on vessel size.

You can also check in/out at Philipsburg in Great Bay, though it's less common. The office, open from 7 am to 5 pm seven days a week, is located just outside the Harbor port gates on the right-hand side.

Bridge Communication: VHF Channel 12

The Dutch Bridge: The Island's Busy Waterway Hub

The Dutch Bridge, located in the southern end of the Simpson Bay Lagoon and adjacent to the Sint Maarten Yacht Club, is the most frequently operated bridge on the island. It services all types of vessels, from commercial traffic to superyachts and recreational boats. Operated by the Simpson Bay Lagoon Authority (SLAC), it functions seven days a week and is the only bridge that imposes a usage fee. At the time of writing, the charge for a 47-foot catamaran for an inbound and outbound trip amounts to \$20.

Unique to the Dutch Bridge are its designated opening times which are structured to regulate traffic flow. Vessels must adhere to these timings and are forbidden to travel against the specified flow direction.

The Causeway (Swing) Bridge: Flexible and Convenient

Situated further south, the Causeway or Swing Bridge allows passage between the southernmost part of the lagoon and the rest of the water body. It operates seven days a week and is distinctive in allowing vessels to pass abreast, much like North American roads, with portside to portside traffic.

The operation of the Causeway Bridge is on demand. To ensure your vessel's passage, it's recommended to call the operator on VHF Channel 12 half an hour before the scheduled opening. This practice is particularly useful for the 10 am and 3:30 pm openings when the operator is most likely already attending to VHF radio communications.

Yachties appreciate Shrimpy's dedication and passion, making the Cruiser's Morning Net an indispensable resource for starting the day right in St. Martin.

Finding Your Piece of Paradise: The Best Anchorages in Saint Martin

St. Martin offers a diverse range of anchorages that cater to the needs of cruisers and yachties. Let's explore these anchorages in more detail:

Lagoon: The Lagoon is a significant anchorage on St. Martin, encompassing both the Dutch and French sides of the island. On the Dutch side, anchoring is primarily concentrated within the defined square area, bordered by the causeway Bridge, Airport Road, Isla Del Sol marina, and Port De Plaisance marina. While the holding is generally good, it can become crowded during high season, limiting the amount of chain that can be deployed. The Dutch side anchorage can be lively, with entertainment from nearby clubs. A weekly fee is required to anchor on the Dutch side. On the French side, the Lagoon is much larger and offers multiple anchoring opportunities. Yachties typically anchor west of the channel that separates the Dutch and French sides. To ensure good holding, it is advisable to locate sandy patches and carefully drop the anchor on the windward side. The bottom of the lagoon can be thick and tangled, which may require a few attempts to secure the anchor properly.

Marigot Bay: Marigot Bay is the largest and most populated anchorage on the island. This expansive bay provides excellent protection against prevailing easterly winds. Boasting acres of sandy bottom, the depths range from approximately 7 to 20 feet. Yachties will encounter a wide variety of boats in Marigot Bay, from modest monohulls to luxurious superyachts. The bay features a large town dinghy dock and convenient access to various services within a short walking distance. The water is clear and inviting, ideal for swimming, but caution should be exercised around dinghies. Marine life such as turtles, rays, and sand sharks can be spotted in the area. It's worth noting that if the wind or swell originates from the north, the bay can become choppy. In rare instances when the swell comes from the northwest, relocating to the Lagoon may be preferable.

In the summer of 2022, the town of Marigot installed 87 mooring balls in the bay. However, these moorings have not been widely embraced by the boating community. While they offer a new and safe option, the short pendants can be uncomfortable on days with swells. Moreover, many mooring blocks are in water depths less than 6 feet, potentially posing a risk for boats with deeper keels. As of now, there is no established method for paying fees for the moorings.

Consequently, they have been practically free to use, although it remains unclear when the town will implement a fee collection system.

<u>Friars Bay:</u> Situated east of Marigot Bay, Friars Bay provides an intimate anchorage where a few boats can enjoy reliable holding and excellent protection from prevailing easterly winds. This smaller anchorage offers a more secluded and exotic atmosphere, adding to its appeal.

<u>Happy Bay:</u> Continuing along the coast, Happy Bay presents a small but charming bay with a fantastic beach that is often uncrowded. It serves as an ideal daytime anchorage and may be suitable for overnight stays under particularly favorable conditions.

Grand Case: As one moves east from Marigot Bay, the next notable anchorage is Grand Case. Boaters should be cautious of a shoal a few hundred yards from the point marking the south end of the bay. Grand Case is another expansive and flat anchorage with numerous sandy patches, allowing for anchoring of multiple vessels. The bay offers excellent protection against prevailing easterly winds. However, wind funneling through a notch in the local hills can create breezy conditions. Yachties will appreciate the amenities in the town, including a well-equipped dinghy dock, superb dining options, and a beautiful beach suitable for walking and swimming. Snorkeling and scuba diving can be enjoyed at Creole Rock or Turtle Reef within the bay. Grand Case is an ideal anchorage for spending a few days or even a week, immersing oneself in its charm and culinary delights.

Anse Marcel: A beautiful and narrow bay located further clockwise along the coast. Boaters should be mindful of rocks along the southerly and westerly part of the entrance. The bay features a stunning white beach, where one can indulge in a delightful beach club lunch amidst a sophisticated setting. Anse Marcel also houses the inner harbor, home to Dream Yacht Charter and the Capitanery, where check-in and check-out procedures can be completed. It is important to note that the bay's unique configuration often results in conflicting winds, currents, and swells. As a result, anchored boats may face different directions, making it slightly challenging to find an optimal spot. Nevertheless, the natural beauty and allure of Anse Marcel make it a worthwhile destination.

<u>Ilet de Pinel</u>: Offers a small yet picturesque anchorage suitable for a limited number of boats, provided the conditions are favorable. The island's natural beauty is captivating, and boaters can enjoy a pleasant dinghy ride to the beach and restaurants on Pinel Island. The protected area surrounding the island offers excellent snorkeling opportunities, while a leisurely hike on the small island adds to the overall experience.

<u>Tintamarre</u>: Located two miles northeast of Ilet de Pinel, Tintamarre is a larger island with a delightful anchorage and several free mooring balls available for use. Exploring the island on foot reveals remnants of a pre-war airfield and various ruins, making for an intriguing excursion.

<u>Orient Bay</u>: Situated along the exposed east side of the island, Orient Bay is a large bay that lacks substantial protection. However, it can serve as a sporadic daytime anchorage near the

vibrant atmosphere of Orient Beach. In optimal conditions, anchoring behind Green Cay may be suitable for overnight stays.

Oyster Pond: Historically a bustling spot, Oyster Pond has experienced a decline in activity since Hurricane Irma in 2017. The removal of wrecks in 2022 has made anchoring possible, but due to the limited attractions and activities, there may be more enticing anchorages available on the island. With recent developments, including a treaty clarifying the Dutch/French border, Oyster Pond may regain its liveliness in the years to come.

<u>Bays on the French Side</u>: Moving counterclockwise from Marigot Bay, several bays on the French side provide additional anchoring options. Baie Rouge features a beautiful and expansive swimming beach suitable for day anchorage in favorable conditions and possibly overnight stays in excellent conditions. Boaters should bring their own beach chairs and coolers in the dinghy as there are no services available. Baie au Prunes offers a similar experience to Baie Rouge, albeit on a smaller scale. Anchoring here provides a view of the island's most exclusive and expensive properties, but it is subject to conditions.

<u>Baie Longue</u>: As the last bay on the French side of the border, Baie Longue is a breathtaking bay that is home to the prestigious La Samana hotel property. The beach and surrounding waters offer spectacular views and are worth a visit if conditions permit.

<u>Mullet Bay</u>: Proceeding in a counterclockwise direction from Baie Longue, Mullet Bay captivates visitors with its awe-inspiring colors. It is one of the most popular beaches on St. Martin, renowned for its stunning beauty. While Mullet Bay often serves as a suitable day anchorage, overnight anchoring is advisable only in the best weather conditions.

<u>Simpson Bay</u>: Continuing eastward, boaters will encounter the beautiful Simpson Bay, which shares similarities with Marigot Bay and Grand Case Bay. Simpson Bay provides a vast expanse of water, accommodating numerous vessels, particularly during high season. The sandy bottom ensures excellent holding. However, the bay is occasionally affected by a strong swell originating from the southern coast of the island. During such conditions, finding a spot closer to the shore or seeking alternative anchorages is recommended. The south end of the bay near Kimsha Beach offers more protection but may be crowded and slightly less picturesque. The areas off Simpson Bay Beach boast vibrant colors but are more susceptible to swells.

<u>Little Bay</u>: Situated further south and east, Little Bay is a picturesque day anchorage. However, due to its popularity among tourist boats, it may be challenging for cruisers to secure a spot.

<u>Great Bay</u>: Finally, as we progress eastward, we arrive at Great Bay, which fronts the largest town on the island, Philipsburg. Although bustling with activity from tourist boats, commercial vessels, and two massive cruise ship piers, Great Bay offers an energetic and vibrant atmosphere. Spending a few days in this bay provides an opportunity to immerse oneself in the lively ambiance and observe people enjoying their vacations.
